It hasn't all been about football either. From great social events to many laughs and chats shared around the ovals, there's been plenty of fun and community spirit throughout the season. Even when some of our teams were put in tough divisions and had challenging results, the resilience and togetherness of players, families, and supporters stood out.

Of course, we also get to celebrate some outstanding on-field achievements. A huge congratulations to our U12 premiership team and to our merged U11 girls team who also took premiership honours. The kids have done the club proud, not just with their results but with the way they've carried themselves as ambassadors of our community. Parents too have shared in the joy, supporting their kids and celebrating their wins with pride.

2025 has been a season full of hard work, resilience, and achievement, and we are proud of our club and members.

## Registrations

Registrations decreased slightly at CBJFC compared to 2024. We had 238 player registrations overall and from these we had 11 girls players that were on a Season Permit out to other clubs including St Pauls McKinnon JFC and St Kilda City JFC. We thank the parent group of these players as well as the clubs that hosted these players.

We again had a good number of registrations in the U8 and U9 age groups and so delighted to be welcoming the next generation of players into the club. We were also able to stand up 2 teams in the U14 age group as well 2 teams in U16. We were also delighted to be able to have an all Girls team in the U16 age group. We know that this playing group had many players that were completely new to the sport and we were delighted with the energy and passion this set of players brought to the field!

#### **Auskick**

Auskick was a huge success at Koornang Park in 2025 with 100+ kids participating. We again ran Auskick sessions on Friday nights (led by Luke Codarin) and Saturday mornings. Thanks very much to Luke for your dedicated efforts in coordinating the sessions and teaching our future footy stars the skills of AFL. Also to all the parents and our junior player coaches out on the field coaching and assisting as well as those behind the scenes in the canteen and at the BBQ.

## Social Engagement

Our social media presence continued to thrive in 2025 through engaging posts, reels and stories that captured the energy, achievements, and spirit of our club.

- Under 15 Mixed: Reached finals in Division 3 after a dominant late-season win over East Brighton. Fought hard in finals and showed great leadership and depth.
- Under 16 Boys (Div 3): Played a memorable home game under lights a first for many players — and showed resilience through a tough season, finishing with three wins and a strong team bond.
- Under 16 Girls: Built from just four experienced players to a squad of 23. Competed strongly despite injuries and showed enormous growth and commitment.
- Under 16 Boys (Div 1): Played in the SMJFL season opener under lights. Despite injuries, they defeated top teams and had multiple players selected for representative squads.

#### **Under 9 Mixed**

Season 2025 was a year of growth, development, and success for our Under 9's team. The season highlighted how far the players have progressed in skill, confidence, resilience, and trust in each other. From where we started in Under 8's in 2024 to where we finished this year has been remarkable. This improvement was not luck—it came from the players applying what they have been taught and consistently putting it into practice on Sunday mornings.

Despite challenging results in 2024, all players chose to return in 2025 (with 3 staying in Under 8's and 1 transferring to Ajax), giving the coaching team confidence that our players were enjoying themselves and engaged with our program.

#### Training & Development

We focused on building from our strengths and addressing weaknesses identified in 2024:

- Introduced "Bear Ball", a training grid used as the foundation of every session. The players quickly understood the purpose and it became central to their development.
- Significant improvement in kick-outs from goal, with players making smarter decisions without constant instruction.
- Introduced an earlier kick-to-kick session before training, giving players 15–20 minutes to work on kicking, marking, and team connection.

A special highlight was having Club Captain Angus Brown attend multiple trainings. His involvement added immense value:

- Worked with small groups to develop all-round skills.
- Contributed training drills and mentoring.
- Encouraged the players not just in football but in their off-field interests as well.

We hope his involvement continues into 2026.

#### Game Day & Performance

This season we asked the kids to continue with last season's focus of fun being the most important thing, but at the same time - turn up to training and games with a want to do well, and also to get our competitive juices flowing.

The season began with a tough first-round reality check, but the team responded strongly and sang the club song more often than not as the year progressed.

A permanent runner and a dedicated sub manager were introduced. This consistency meant:

- Clear, familiar communication of messages.
- Equal rotations for all players at the 3-minute mark, regardless of the game situation.
- Reinforcement of trust in every player's ability to contribute.

A key turning point came in our third match against Ajax. We challenged players and parents to drop talk of "unfair matchups" and instead focus on controlling what we could. The result was an inspiring victory, leaving parents emotional with pride.

The season ended with the footy carnival. After winning the first game, the players were challenged to win all three matches before singing the club song. They rose to the occasion, winning all three and finishing the season on a high.

#### Under 12 Mixed

The U12s season began with all the enthusiasm and excitement we have come to expect from this team. Despite a challenging season last year, most of the squad returned determined to take on the new season with gusto. While we lost a couple of key players who had been playing up in previous years and had elected to do another season of U11s, we also welcomed seven new players to the club, half of which had never played before. As has always been the case the boys embraced their new teammates and their families instantly became part of our Bears community.

Preseason commenced in February and for the first time since Covid, we would have the opportunity to train at Koornang Park during the regular season. As if the homecoming was not enough, training under the glow of the brand-new lights lifted the energy levels even higher. Coach Luke and Darcy returned to assist, and we also received a massive boost with Coach Scott available every week enabling the large squad to settle into a regular routine. Consistently high numbers on the track enabled the boys to improve as a collective and the on-field results would soon reflect the hard work and commitment put in by all.

A strong start in the qualifying games (three wins and one loss) lifted the confidence of the boys and it was clear that they had improved throughout the previous year despite the results. While we could have moved up to Division 4 where we had been competitive but winless last year, we opted to remain in Division 5 to enable the players a chance to learn how to win and to give the inexperienced players an opportunity to develop.

It would soon become apparent that the division was one of two halves with the top three sides extremely competitive and the others struggling to keep up. With most players available each week we would regularly play with five or six on the bench. In line with our team values every player would get equal time on the field throughout the regular season,

and it is a credit to our leadership group and experienced players that they continued to accept the rotations no matter what the score in the game.

Sitting on top of the ladder after the first seven games due to a high percentage, we would come up against the other undefeated side, Waverley Hawks. With a poorly timed party at Luna Park reducing our numbers to nineteen, we soon realised that the season was not going to be as easy as a few had come to believe. A narrow two-point loss against a very good team was the reality check we needed and provided the impetus for the team to refocus on improving every week.

The season trend of easy wins against the lower teams continued while a second loss to Waverley, this time at home, and another loss to the third placed Hampton Rovers meant the upcoming final series would be an open affair. There would be no hubris – just a fierce determination to play at our best when it mattered most. The consistent numbers at training never dropped off – enabling our preparation to be as good as it could be. In the lead up to the finals it was made clear to players and families alike that we would predominantly play our best 18-20 in the finals. The way this was accepted by both players and their families was a credit to all. The team first, selfless mentality would prove to be invaluable over the next few weeks.

After finishing second on the ladder, we were lucky enough to host the first semi-final at KP. The coaches knew we were primed and so the message on the day was simple - play as we had all year. Play team first unselfish football, be the best and fairest tackling side, and more than anything else – have fun. In perfect conditions and with a great crowd in attendance, the boys played a flawless game of football, reversing a four-goal loss to Hampton a few weeks earlier to run out comfortable winners 45 points to 1 and book our spot in the Grand Final against the dominant Waverley Hawks.

The Grand Final was always going to be an epic affair between the best two teams of the year and it did not disappoint. In a game where the wind blew strongly to one end all day, the lead changed every quarter as both teams gave everything they had. When the final siren sounded, it would be the Bears on top, coming from two points behind at three quarter time to win by six points in an absolute nailbiter. Amazing scenes after the game as a team that had proved winning is not everything the year before, would have the best day of their football lives, basking in premiership glory. The joy on their faces was priceless as were the beaming smiles of their families and friends.

I am so proud of this team. They did everything asked of them from the first training session to the last. They supported each other both on and off the field and played a brand of football the club should be proud of. With two sides in the under 14 age group, we went through a comprehensive grading process for the first time, allowing each side to have a set list to work with for the year. It was hoped that with this set side in each division, rather than last year's rotation of players through two teams, we could create a more connected two side system with a greater sense of "team" for the kids.

After our finals appearance last year, everyone was looking to take the next step and improve our game play. Reaching the finals last year with many kids that had never played football before was a great effort, but we knew we would still have to improve to take the next step. An early preseason gave us the opportunity to train and practice a new game style. Our training and practice revolved around a high possession style of game, with an emphasis on short kicking and high handball rate. We focused on lots or run and carry due to our lack of height and marking targets.

After limited success in the grading games, we found ourselves in division 5 with 7 other clubs. We knew most of the other sides in the division and had played them the previous year, we also knew that we could challenge most of them on a good day.

For the next 7 weeks, our boys competed valiantly, implementing our new style of play, but with limited success. At the halfway point of the year, we found ourselves with just the one win but knew we could turn it around for the run home. After some heavy losses and one particularly large loss to Ajax, we had our usual team meeting and match review before training on Wednesday night. We knew a finals appearance would be hard but decided to make some new team rules and goals for our last half of the season. Our new rules were:

- 1. Not worry about the score board and stick to our game plan.
- 2. No broken tackles, and an emphasis on tackling each week at training.
- 3. Making sure whoever we played, we would fight for every possession for the whole game.

With this new vision of how we wanted to be seen by other teams, we set out to turn things around for the last part of the season. Our new emphasis on tackling and aggression at the ball was noticeable for the last 8 games of the year. We greatly decreased our losing margin in each game as opposed to the previous front half of the year. The new spirit was noticeable in the playing group as well, with a measurable jump in our team enjoyment even after some close losses. The overall team spirit was high, with a new vigour to not let each other down in the hard moments.

With some fantastic team spirit we made some real improvements in coming together as a team and learning a new style of football. The overall attitude of our playing group was exceptional, even after our limited success for the year. Our players had the opportunity to play in new positions and learn new skills. After each close loss we made sure we had positive match reviews, making sure to discuss our good points from each game as well as things we would work on at training and match day. A real character-building moment was displayed by these young men, taking a stand at the halfway point of the year and saying to each other that we can be better than this. It would have been easy to continue as we had the same the first 7 games, but the boys really stood up and showed maturity and turned things around for the later part of the year.

Overall, a great year of football was crafted after a tough start. I was personally impressed with the team spirit and overall improvement for the year. At the end of the day, I think our enjoyment for the game came from what we learned from some tight losses and how to handle the hard times.

A huge thanks must go out to David Ratner and the under 12's who helped out with numbers on most Sundays; without this help some games may have been forfeited, so thank you guys. Thanks to the div 2 coaches, Troy and Andrew, for their support and help with training for the year. To our assistant coach "Buzz" and our runner Adrian, thanks gentlemen for your hard work and invaluable match day insights. To our team manager Cathy Foden, great job for the year, your help behind the scenes, keeping on top of numbers before the game, and match day efforts went above and beyond. To all the parents, thank you for your support during the year, I could not have asked for a

better group, always ready to step up and help with all the jobs that are required to keep a side on the field.

Looking forward to seeing everyone back for a big 2026

## Treasurer's Report

The Caulfield Bears JFC have recorded a profit in 2025 of \$5,567. A lower number of teams as well as discounts in certain age groups resulted in lower revenues across Registrations and Canteen and Bar, though these have been partly offset by lower operating expenses across relevant categories. While sponsorship was also down from FY24, it was still very high relative to seasons past. Overall operating expenses were in line with past seasons, with medical expenses higher due to the increased usage of ECR and the ongoing commitment to maintaining trainer qualifications. Several balance sheet adjustments also impacted the net profit. \$3.8k in inventory (white shorts) was written off as these are no longer used, resulting in a higher merchandise expense relative to sales. Inventory now also includes new jumpers purchased in FY25, where they had previously been fully expensed.

The financial position of the club remains very strong with high cash reserves.

## Registrations

Registration income in 2025 was significantly lower due to the lower number of teams and due to the committee reducing fees across several age groups to ensure we could attract sufficient playing numbers. ## Sponsorship/Grants

#### Merchandise

A complete stocktake of all saleable items was completed and inventory recorded at cost. Current stock on hand is \$20,144, with the new jumpers purchased in FY25 now on the balance sheet to allow improved tracking Training tops that are provided to players have been allocated to the Cost of Goods Sold, as were the design costs for the FY25 tops.

## Medical Expense

Medical expenses are in line with previous seasons. There was an ongoing utilisation of Colmed medical staff with the two grounds being used. In addition to this, the club continued to invest in trainers by offering to cover the costs of volunteers gaining or upgrading their medical qualifications to assist in ensuring that there would be sufficient trainers available across all teams. This offer was once again taken up by many parents and managed successfully by Joe Cremin.

#### SMJFL Fees

SMJFL fees consist predominantly of umpiring fees. The decrease this year primarily relates to the lower number of higher aged teams and a lower number of teams that played in finals.

## Capital Investment

The club did not make any capital purchases this season.

## Thank you

Finally, after five years on the committee I am stepping down as Treasurer to focus on coaching. I would like to thank the club and committee for the opportunity to contribute to making this club such a wonderful place to be. I leave knowing the club finances continue to be strong, and that the financial systems that we have put in place over the last few years will enable this critical function to be more secure and transparent than it has ever been.
