Game Highlights:

As I have said, the movie script writes itself.

Twelve months ago, this team had been through a brutal season. Struggling with player numbers, the team put in a valiant effort but wins were hard to come by and thus they ended up cellar dwellers for the year. Looking ahead, the future looked grim but this is where the club stood up. First they tapped into the senior club and were able to engage a new coach and assistants. This was great move as the senior players could communicate with the lads in the way parents couldn't and could remain objective. Secondly, the new team mangers went on a recruiting drive that left no club in the eastern suburbs untouched.
